

My Brothers, My Sisters,

The Parish of the Assumption has received a new Carillon from the Pinto family. It fills the Church with appropriate religious music, not only during Mass times, but throughout the day. We are very grateful to the Pinto family members for their generosity. We are also grateful to all the Parish volunteers who made the celebration of the Christmas days a beautiful and holy experience. The same gratitude is extended to their Altar Rosary Society whose Jesse Tree outreach again benefited the McCloskey Home.

We extend the gratitude of the Parish to the volunteers of Immaculate Conception whose positive Christmas dispositions also made the Christmas days memorable and prayerful. The Jesse Tree Outreach was magnanimous. Sixteen parishes received bags of Christmas gifts from the parishioners whose love for the needy provided more than 2300 gifts. Many parishes of the Archdiocese were touched by the love of our parishioners.

Scott Marrone, the new Director of our Music Ministry at Immaculate Conception, wants to enlarge the choir. Do not say you cannot sing. He is the Director; he will know if you can help the choir. He is also looking for those of the Parish who can play a musical instrument. How wonderful it would be for the parish if some would come forward and share with the parish the talent, the Lord God has given to them.

This weekend, following the 5:30 PM Mass on Saturday and the 12 noon Mass on Sunday, in the lower church, Father Walsh wants personally to say farewell to the parish that he has served for thirty two years of priestly ministry. No gift is necessary, only the pleasure of your company and his opportunity to say thank you for the love and friendship you have extended to him.

With the departure of Father Walsh, revisions in our Parochial Mass schedule must be made. The Parish Council is assisting the pastor to decide *the hour* of that *one* Sunday Mass to be celebrated at Assumption Church. For the Parish of the Immaculate Conception, we must eliminate a weekday Mass. The hour of the Mass to be eliminated is presently being discussed. These changes are required since Father Walsh will not be replaced. Funeral and Wedding Nuptials make these changes necessary. The code is very clear. Only on rare occasions can a priest say three Masses on a given day. It is the responsibility of the Pastor to be faithful to that law of the Church. Please bear in mind that the Italian Mass on the first Sunday of the month at 8:30 AM (with the exception of July and August) will still be celebrated.

Father Patrick Walsh has been with me for almost five years. Accepting his decision to leave was not easy, neither for him nor for me. I thank him sincerely for his long and dedicated service to a parish that he loved and who in turn loved him. His care for the sick was very clear to me. His endless visits to hospitals are proof of that. He worked with the Rosary Society and the Knights of Columbus, who always knew they had an advocate in Father Walsh. Being with him was joyful. He knew the history of Immaculate Conception as no one knew it. His recollections were enjoyed by all of us at mealtime. He goes with our gratitude and our prayers, fully aware that he will not forget his home these many years.

Tomorrow is January 17th, Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. It is a national holiday throughout the country. We are forever grateful to Doctor King and his very Christian approach to the issue of civil rights and what he has done to advance the cause of justice among us. The second reading last Sunday from the Acts of the Apostles gives us the spiritual foundation for the Catholic Christian attitude. "I can see," says Saint Peter, "that with God there is no partiality!" To overlook those words of Jesus is to compromise our Baptismal promise. We are called to examine our attitudes, (our biases, our prejudices) in the light of Catholic Christian Scriptural teaching. Through the Holy Spirit may we be honest in our reflections.


Know well, dear Parishioners, that your generosity through Midnight Run, HOPE, and Jesse Tree, already speaks of your love and of your conviction that with the Lord, there is no partiality. It remains for us to connect this generous spirit with our interior words and feelings if we are to be like God, *faithful*, to our Catholic Christian vocations.

On Tuesday, January 18th, we begin a very important ecumenical week, a Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. Next week, my column will address that.

On Monday, January 24, the annual March in behalf of the sanctity of life will take place in Washington. The Church must be very visible in standing tall in behalf of the inalienable right of every human being to life. Let us not be hardened by the disrespect for the sanctity of life by the never-ending reports of car bombings in Iraq and in Israel, together with the billion dollar industry of abortion. Page 5 of the bulletin includes information about how you can join us on a bus trip to Washington in order to take a stand for life! Think about it.

I close by thanking Bill and Kathleen Humphries. The Jesse Tree Outreach is a very demanding commitment and they accept it so willingly and generously.

Lord God, bless our families. May 2005 teach all of us your compassion, your understanding, your love. May we connect that to family relationships. Much love! One with you in the Holy Spirit,

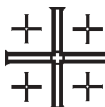

TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

The Baptism of the Lord Jesus celebrates the mission that Jesus received from the Father, and this mission continues to be the main focus of the readings this week. John the Baptist points the way for us, telling us that Jesus is the "Lamb of God" the one upon whom the Holy Spirit rests. Today is a real turning point, the completion of the cycle of readings that speak about Jesus' beginnings. In the weeks to come until the beginning of Lent we will be turning to the Gospel of Matthew, the calling of the first disciples and the Sermon on the Mount for our inspiration.

The first reading and the psalm both return to the notion of Israel as servant of the Lord, an image that the Church has long applied to the person of Jesus. He is the suffering servant, the one who accepts the will of God in all things. The reading from Saint Paul is the beginning of the first Letter to the Corinthians. So we have the end of the cycle about Jesus' birth to his baptism and the beginning of what is to come all in one celebration. Perhaps this is to help us understand that in a sense the mystery of Christ cannot be divided into seasons: each season affects the others because the wonder of his birth and the graces of his life and the power of his death cannot be split. It is one event, one saving moment, one grace.

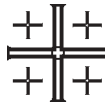
LEADERSHIP TRAINING IN EDUCATION FOR PARENTING

TAX SUBSTANTIATION LETTERS

We often receive requests for tax substantiation letters. These letters summarize donations for the tax year. Some people use these letters to prepare their tax returns. Many include the letter with the tax return when it is mailed to the IRS. Some will only request the letter in the event of an audit.

If you are a registered parishioner (if you received the Christmas mailing, you are registered), we can provide you with a tax substantiation letter if you are using the envelope system. If you are not a registered parishioner but regularly attend Immaculate Conception or Assumption Churches, why not call the rectory and register with us?

Anyone who would like a tax substantiation letter should call the rectory. It would be helpful if you have your envelope with you when you call. Your letter will be available at the rectory the following weekend or can be mailed to you.

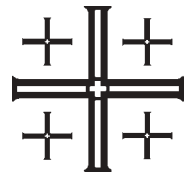

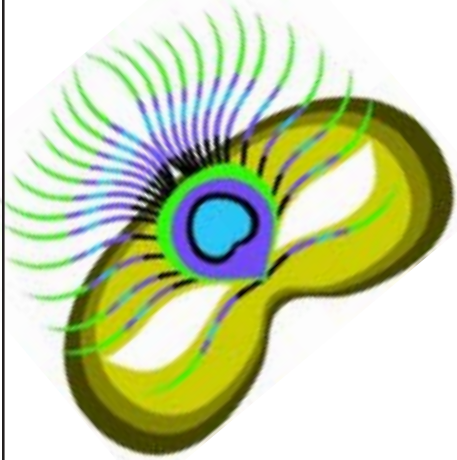

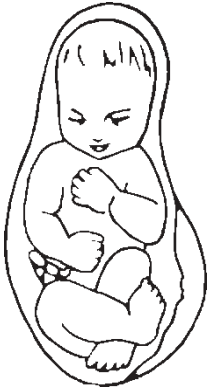

The March for Life is the one day of the year when the primary focus is on the plight of our tiny, innocent, preborn neighbors. All human life is entitled to protection. When one class of human beings is denied that protection, then we are all in danger. Come join us at the March for Life on Monday, January 24th, 2005 in Washington, D.C.

There will be buses leaving from Immaculate Heart of Mary Church in Scarsdale at 6:30 AM on January 24th, returning approximately 11 PM. The cost is \$30. Reservations are required. Life Principles

(Adopted in 1974)

These Life Principles express the ideals motivating prolife Americans and indicate the purpose of the MARCH FOR LIFE:

We hold these truths to be self-evident: That all human beings are created equal and are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, among which is the right to life, and

The right to life of each human being shall be presented and protected by every human being in the society and by the society as a whole, and

The life of each human being shall be preserved and protected from that human beings biological beginning when the Father's sperm fertilizes the Mother's ovum, and

The life of each human being shall be preserved and protected from the biological beginning throughout the natural continuum of the human beings life by all available ordinary means and reasonable efforts, and

The life of each human being shall be preserved and protected at each stage of X life continuum to the same extent as at each and every other stage regardless of state of health or condition of dependency, and

The life of each human being shall be preserved and protected to the same extent as the life of each and every other human being regardless of state of health or condition of dependency, and

When there is any doubt that there exists a human being's life to preserve and protect, such doubt shall be resolved In favor of the existence of a human being and

When two or more human beings are in a situation in which their lives are mutually endangered, all available ordinary means and reasonable efforts shall be used to preserve and to protect the life of each and every human being so endangered.

WHEREFORE, Pursuant To These Principles, we recommend and urge the adoption of a Mandatory HUMAN LIFE AMENDMENT to the Constitution of the United States of America

APPLYING THE LIFE PRINCIPLES

Realizing that no sound action can grow out of a vacuum of purpose, in 1974 the MARCH FOR LIFE formulated and included in its charter of incorporation, the *Life Principles*, as shown above. Purposefully, the *Life Principles* are not framed in the negative tone of "thou shalt not," and are framed in the positive tone of duty and responsibility of each human being and of society. The *Life Principles* are set in the context of our Declaration of Independence — that the right to life is inalienable and endowed by our Creator. If this basic right is weakened, all other rights are meaningless, as disparagement of the value and dignity of human beings permeates society's mentality and the Laws of our Land.

The *Life Principles* address seven basic considerations. The seven principles must be read together, and collectively state the purpose of the MARCH FOR LIFE:

- It is the duty of each individual and of society operating through its laws to provide protection for each member of the society. This follows the basic homicide laws of the common law that society protects a member from assault and death.

- The protection shall extend from the beginning of each human being's life - acknowledged to be when the father's sperm fertilizes the mother's ovum — and throughout the natural continuum of that human being's life.
