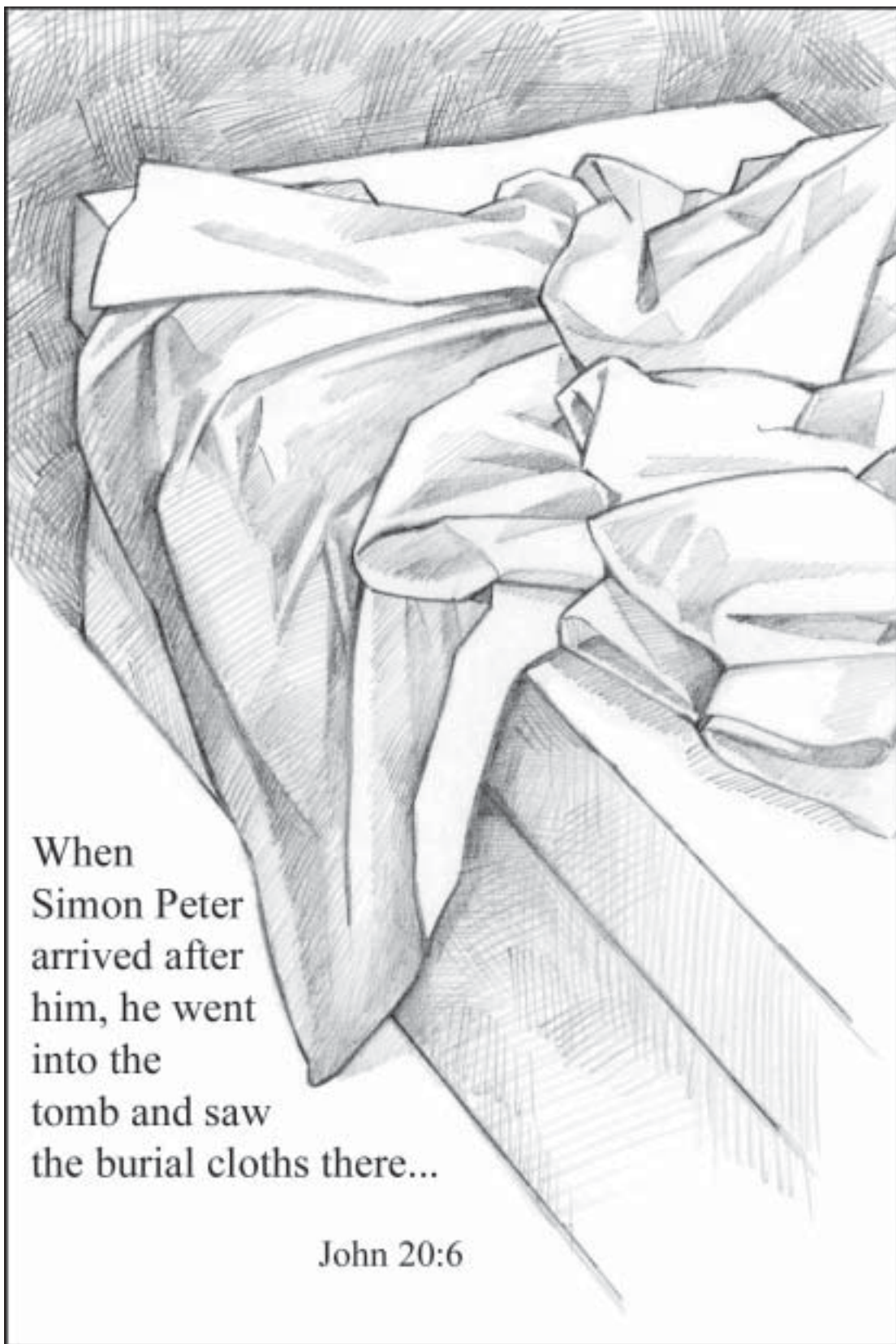

My Brothers, My Sisters,

With a sincere and warm embrace, I extend a welcome to your Church on this most important feast day in its liturgical year. May this liturgical celebration so touch your being that you will know your parish always welcomes you for who you are and what you are. In this sense, in the name of the entire parish and its multiple staffs, I bid you welcome! May the peace of this day be forever remembered!

We all know what today is. The world calls it "Easter Sunday" with little understanding of what Easter is, or how it is connected to this life. There is a segment of society that calls this day "The Great Solemnity of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ". No doubt, we are a much smaller number than those who see this only as a holiday. The regret is how members of the larger population sell themselves short, by living with no understanding about their limited vision of the consequences of their profound absence of meaning. Far from ignorance being bliss, ignorance is a curse, a blinding and dwarfing experience, a debilitating curse!

Then what is Easter for us? It is not just Easter. It is the Resurrection from death of Jesus Christ. *Alright, alright! So it is a change of the name. So what! What is the difference? The difference!* Words become useless when trying to understand the difference. Perhaps the difference can be more clearly understood by symbol and comparison.

Suppose that you have won one of those major lotteries. You are guaranteed the sum of \$50,000 every month for as long as you live! There is no limit to those months nor is there any diminishing of that sum as the months wear on. What would you think? Would you finally know throughout every fiber of your being that worry and work were never to be part of your existence? How could that be? \$50,000 destroys completely every worry and work. Worry and work can never add to your security with that kind of monthly income. How carefree could one be? How indifferent can one be to any demands of any situation! With that kind of income, make the demands more demanding, and your security is not even tried, let alone threatened.

The difference of meaning between the words "Easter" and "Resurrection" can begin to be understood in the light of that hyperbole. *Is that the end of it?* Were it the end, then the word difference has no significance. The power, the glory, and exuberance of the difference of the meanings of the words are in their connection to our lives.

For those who say today is "Easter Sunday", it is a family day with families lovingly together, sharing food, stories, and laughter. But come Monday, Easter 2005 is finished like any other family holiday. But those who *know* it as the Resurrection of the dead body of Jesus Christ, amazingly returned to life, its connection to their personal lives is far different! Come Monday, Resurrection 2005 *continues*. Come the holidays of summer, of the fall, of the winter, Resurrection 2005 *continues* in all of its depth, in all of its power.

With Resurrection 2005, we are again reminded by a Spirit-guided Church that death is gone: my death, your death, the death of all our loved ones. The death of all the holocaust victims is gone. *They live now*. They live better now than at any other moment of their days and years on earth! *Now that is a difference!* Every one of us is terrified of our own death. With that fear forever gone, isn't it a difference to celebrate!

But that is not all. We all harbor another fear within our psyche: the penalty of our sins for having rebelled against the order of the omnipotent God, with the consequence that our sins have caused and contributed to the pain of others. How, beaten down with that opprobrium, do we expiate that guilt? Fear not!! The death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ has removed, expiated, cancelled, and lifted the heavy, heavy burden of all the guilt of a misspent life. Incredibly, so expiated, it is even forgotten. Reflection of these two gifts: our deaths and our **sins mercifully forgiven** and more **mercifully forgotten** by an ever-loving personal God whose Passion, Death and Resurrection have made it so. *Free at last! Free at last! Thank God Almighty - free at last!*

My brothers and sisters, we who are so gifted with faith, know today to be the unimaginable Feast of Resurrection which tells the truth about what today is for each of us without exception. Happy Resurrection Day, beloved brothers and sisters! Happy Resurrection Day!!

I share with you a special joy. Into the fold of faith, fully initiated through Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist, is our catechumen, Wayne Cimon. With him comes candidate James Kenworthy who made his profession of Catholic faith and is now in Full Communion with us. Together with them, completing their initiation through the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist are Ana Rita Moran and Deanna Grossi. Next week we will let you know the names of the children who were baptized and the two teenagers who completed their initiation. I speak a special word of welcome and join in their joy. With gratitude to Sister Rose Vermette, who so capably facilitated this process along with the entire RCIA Team, Mike Farrell, Anita Giangreco, Nilsa McAdams, Kathy and Tom McAteer.

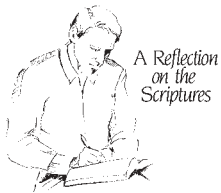

TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

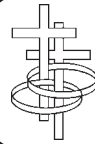

The death of Jesus has brought about a confusing and hopeless situation of despondency and grief for his followers. They are in the dark. It is "while it is still dark," that Mary Magdalene makes

her way to the tomb of Jesus. She is not ready for what she sees, an empty tomb. Even as she is unknowingly announcing the resurrection of the Lord to Peter and the Beloved Disciple, she is running *away* from the tomb, she has as yet no faith in the resurrection. Peter and the Beloved Disciple do not have faith yet either, but they are running *toward* the tomb. Something of faith is starting to stir in them. While they run together, the Beloved Disciple arrives at the tomb first, but does not enter. He recognizes Peter's primacy in the community (John 1.42), but when he does enter the tomb, "he saw and believed." Resurrection faith is born in the one who loves and is loved by Jesus. This is not said at this time of Peter, whose time will come in chapter 21 of the Gospel, when he affirms his love of the Lord three times. What they both saw was the burial cloths and the head cloth. When Lazarus emerged from the tomb in chapter 11, the burial cloths are attached to him. What the disciples witness is resurrection, not resuscitation. The trappings of death are gone for Jesus. Notice that the Beloved Disciple is anonymous, while Mary and Peter are named. This is to make the point that we too are beloved disciples, who loved and are loved, and his example is offered to us "to see and believe" that Jesus is risen. © 2003, OCP Publications. TAX SUBSTANTIATION LETTERS

We often receive requests for tax substantiation letters. These letters summarize donations for the tax year. Some people use these letters to prepare their tax returns. Many include the letter with the tax return when it is mailed to the IRS. Some will only request the letter in the event of an audit.

If you are a registered parishioner (if you received the Lenten mailing, you are registered), we can provide you with a tax substantiation letter if you are using the envelope system. If you are not a registered parishioner but regularly attend Immaculate Conception or Assumption Churches, why not call the rectory and register with us?

Anyone who would like a tax substantiation letter should call the rectory. It would be helpful if you have your envelope with you when you call. Your letter will be available at the rectory the following weekend or can be mailed to you.

THE YEAR OF THE EUCHARIST

SPECIAL INDULGENCES

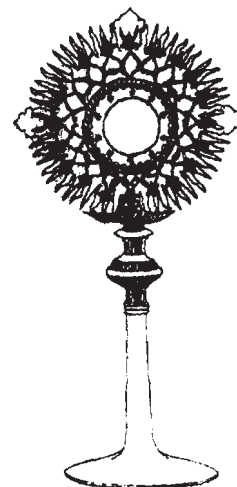
In establishing this year as the Year of the Eucharist, Pope John Paul II authorized special indulgences for Catholics for Eucharistic Adoration and Prayer before the Eucharist. An indulgence is a remission of the temporal punishment due for sins committed. According to Cardinal J. Francis Stafford, who heads the Apostolic Penitentiary, the purpose of establishing these indulgences is to encourage in the faithful "a deeper knowledge of and a more intense love" for the Eucharist. On January 14, the Vatican published the cardinal's statement announcing the indulgences and outlining the requirements for receiving them.

The special Year of the Eucharist indulgences include the normal requirements set by the Church for all plenary indulgences:

Within a reasonably short period of time, the person goes to confession, receives the Eucharist, and prays for the intentions of the Pope, all in a spirit of total detachment from the attraction of sin.

Special plenary indulgences, according to Cardinal Stafford, would be given to those who fulfill the normal requirements in conjunction with participating "with the attention and piety in a sacred function or a pious exercise carried out in honor of the Blessed Sacrament, either solemnly exposed or preserved in the tabernacle."

Additionally, those who recite the Vespers and compline prayers of the Liturgy of the Hours in a church or chapel where the Eucharist is present in the tabernacle will receive a plenary indulgence.



WHAT IS DIVINE MERCY?

It is the devotion to Jesus and His “Divine Mercy” based on the diary of St. Faustina Kowalska, an uneducated Polish nun. The diary is composed of revelations she received directly from Jesus. He expressed His desire to grant “unimaginable graces to those souls who trust in His Mercy” (D, 687). The essence of the devotion to the Divine Mercy is *trust*. *Divine Mercy* “*Heal the hurts and unforgiveness that prevent us from drawing closer to You.*”

A hundred years ago the world was consecrated to the Sacred Heart. Today there is greater need to experience God’s love and forgiveness. In the turmoil of the world today, mankind needs to turn with trust to His Divine Mercy and the sacraments of forgiveness and Eucharist. On May 23, 2000, Pope John-Paul II fulfilled Jesus’ desire to establish the feast of the Divine Mercy. This feast is to be celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Today, more than ever, we need to accept and live Jesus’ message of mercy.

THE DIVINE MERCY IMAGE

Jesus commissioned Saint Faustina to have an image painted of Him as He appeared to her in a vision: with red and pale rays coming from the area of His heart. The rays represent the blood and water which flowed from His pierced side on the cross. His right hand is raised in blessing and His left hand points to His merciful heart which is open to all. The image was to be signed “Jesus, I Trust In You”.

THE CHAPLET

In His revelation to St. Faustina, Our Lord made it clear the chaplet was not only for her, but also for the whole world. He attached extraordinary promises to its recitation. “Through the chaplet, you will obtain everything, if what you ask for is compatible with My will” (diary 1731). The chaplet is prayed on rosary beads. Pamphlets with explanation of how to pray the chaplet can be found at the entrance of the church.

DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

Immaculate Conception will be hosting a Divine Mercy Service on Sunday, April 3rd (Divine Mercy Sunday) beginning with Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament at 2:30 PM with Recitation of the Chaplet at 3PM.

PLENARY INDULGENCE

A special plenary indulgence includes recitation of the Chaplet and the reception of the Eucharist on Divine Mercy Sunday along with the recent reception of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. A Lenten Reconciliation would cover the requirement. The recipient must be in the state of grace. Let us not miss out on His outpouring of Mercy.

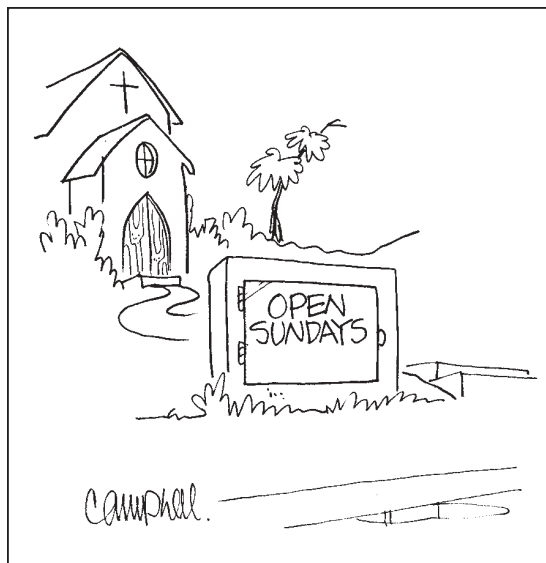
